NALSAR was accorded the status of Category - I University under the UGC (Categorization of Universities (only) for Grant of Graded Autonomy) Regulations, 2018. This means that the institution now has the autonomy to start new programmes and course offerings without the approval of the UGC.

17. Does the Institution have Management Information System?

Yes, as reported in AQAR 2016-2017 NALSAR has the following ESS System:

ESS (E-Student Services) System is the nextgen version of Management Information System driven by Choice Based Elective System which most of the universities are contemplating to implement, the practice in the ESS system is as follows:

- a) **Student admission into the Academic and Examination system is managed by generating unique student identification number which is his/her authentication parameter till they graduate.**
- b) **Class scheduling with space and time complexity modulation in an optimized manner is carried out by the system job processing.**
- c) **Attendance Module enables generation of subject based attendance report which is integrated with class scheduling module.**
- d) **Results Module generates semester wise, year wise and transcript wise reports of each student and also enables to generate class-wise, mandatory-wise, elective-wise, clinic – wise, Assignment –wise results sheets. Along with these reports, the results module accommodates repeat results in to the transcript with appropriate annotation.**
- e) **Consolidation module helps in generating reports which helps selecting gold medallists, subject matter experts, tutorship filtering etc.**
- f) **Feedback module of the system captures student feedback on classes they have attended, teachers taught, library services accessed so that all the components of teacher learning mechanism are upgraded appropriately.**

All the students are required to do internship during November and December every year.		
NALSAR believes that learning is not done in the classroom alone but also at place of work. To give practical insight, the University has systematic student- run winter and summer internship programmes. The students of the B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) and LL.M. Degree Courses do		

internships with government and non-governmental organisations, national and international legal corporates, senior lawyers and law firms. Some students work as interns (Law Clerks) with the Hon'ble Judges of the Supreme Court and High Courts. Internship Placement is made keeping in view the preferences and competence of the students. Orientation training is given to the students to prepare them for placement with different organizations and the type of work which they are supposed to do as interns.

1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

As reported in AQAR 2016-2017, the University has a well-structured system of obtaining feedback from all stakeholders. In the reporting year, it was acknowledged that the work and effort of teaching assistants was greater than the credits allocated for the task. Consequently, upon duly processing the representation of the senior students, the credits for Teaching Assistantship was increased from 3 credits to 4 credits.

In order to strengthen the social science component of the B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) Programme, the University required students to opt atleast nine credits worth of social science seminars. These seminars were to be offered in the second year of the degree programme. However, both subject faculty and students reported that students needed more maturity to cope with the difficulty level of the seminars. Since the University did not wish to dumb down the learning experience, these seminars were shifted to the senior years of the degree programme. A major benefit of this shift was that the social science faculty retained contact with the students right up to the graduation year. The isolation that social science faculty experience in other law schools was thereby averted. An unintended consequence of the shift was that the second year of the degree became unduly light. Several representations were received from students to enhance the workload in second year. Consequently, the University started to offer external social science seminar and elective courses from specialisations not existing in the University.

Law school teaching has been considered overly labour intensive not leaving time and space for research. Only self-driven faculty are able to contribute to research and publication. Faculty members felt there was not enough incentive for research. In order to encourage faculty to devote time and attention to research and publication, the University floated a Faculty Incentive Scheme which provided academic and financial incentives to faculty publishing in internationally renowned journals.

2.3.2 Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The University has a structured mentoring system. University introduced Teaching Assistantship where senior students and LL.M. students conduct tutorial sessions for the junior students. Each Teaching Assistant is assigned no more than 16 students. This system is designed to aid individualized learning and promote peer-to-peer interaction. The system functions in a structured manner as the Teaching Assistant is entitled to course credits and the activity is closely monitored by the subject teacher and a dedicated faculty who oversees the tutoring programme.

In addition to the formal academic support, informal social support is provided through the Mentor-Mentee programme which is an initiative of senior students. Under this programme, upon admission every fresh

student is assigned a senior student as Mentor who help in the academic and social challenges of University life.

University also provides senior students as Moot Mentors for the first year students. Moot Mentors also get academic credits for providing guidance to the juniors for improving their moot skills.

Students are free to approach faculty members any time for project discussions, for preparation of moot memorials, for publication of research papers, conference papers etc. Faculty members extend full support and cooperation to the students for their co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in addition to their academic activities.

2.7 Student Satisfaction Survey

2.7.1 Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS) on overall institutional performance (Institution may design the questionnaire) (results and details be provided as web link)

Student satisfaction and feedback informs all policies of the University. Whilst feedback on the academic programme is systematically obtained through a structured questionnaire administered soon after the mid-semester examination results have been declared. This is done to enable students to respond to the questions on the exam papers and evaluation system. The feedback is obtained separately for each subject in order to avoid comparative bias and respondent fatigue. This feedback is physically obtained as students believe that virtual feedback would compromise confidentiality.

Students satisfaction on other aspects of University functioning is obtained through thematic open houses that are conducted by the Vice-Chancellor or other senior faculty members. The open house process of assessing student satisfaction is preferred over online

surveys as it allows for dialogue between the university authorities and the students and enables a participative system of governance. Many a grievance has been settled through these periodic open dialogues. In addition, the Vice-Chancellor and other functionaries of the University are open to direct communication. Students commonly email both their grievances and their aspirations to the authorities who either accept the student request or provide reasoned response for not being able to do so.

The above said appreciations were received for the following initiatives of the University:

- 10 days Paralegal Certification Course to 500 paralegals was organized by the University. These paralegals are working in the State of Telangana and A.P. and helping the poor in getting secured land rights. This programme was appreciated by the Govt. of India and its adoption to 17 other states has been recommended.
- NALSAR created and implemented a unique low cost community driven land records updation model in six villages of Warangal, Mahaboobabad and Jangaon District. Three legal youth from each village were trained to undertake a four step process of collecting the land data and updating the land records. Through this process all the land owners in Puttalabhupathi village have received Patta of their land after decades. This has been appreciated by various key officials in Government of India and the State Government. This is considered for adoption by Governments as part of Digital India Land Records Modernization Programme of Government of India for updating and modernizing land records.
- As part of Community Driven Land Records updation, 73 tribal families received land records kits containing PPB, TD, Pahani, IB, proceedings copy and Tippan. They have got about 22,00,000 crop loan from the bank. 50 SC families in Gopalagiri village got pattas. 60 families in Kannayapally received pattas.

The alumni association has primarily been focussing on organising get together in India and abroad. The foreign chapters especially provide support to fresh entrants and assist them in settling down. In addition, individual members provide financial support to the co-curricular programmes of the University. Alumni have facilitated the internship and recruitment programme of the University.

CRITERION VI –GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The AQAR 2016 – 2017 had reported the streamlining of the research programme of the University by re-structuring the earlier established centres and setting up of new centres. This activity was undertaken to ensure that the centres in the University reflected the expertise available in the faculty. A number of centres were set up at the behest of the faculty. In order to encourage faculty initiative and to accord full freedom to the faculty to realise their research goals a sum of Rs. 2 lakhs was allocated to each centre as seed money to envision and execute the research, publication and advocacy mandate of their respective centres. This freedom has been utilised by the faculty members to deepen knowledge in their subject areas as well as to develop networks with other experts in the field. In this manner the University has provided space for diverse methods of doing research and producing knowledge.

The University has a dedicated budget for scholarships and student activities. In the reporting year a sum of Rs. 100 lakhs was allocated for their co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Whilst a detailed discussion takes place between the Student Bar Council and the Vice-Chancellor on the budget allocation. The planning and execution of each activity entirely resides with the Student Body. Whilst some of the activities are undertaken by the Student Bar Council (which is an elected body) namely sponsoring student participation in ADR Competitions, Mediation Tournaments, Debating Championships, Mooting Competitions, Quiz Competitions, Essay Writing Competitions, Sports Competitions and organising Debating Championships, Literary Fest, Quiz Fest, Mediation & Negotiation Competitions, Moot Court Competitions, Film Festival etc.

Students through different forums invite eminent people to deliver special lectures on various aspects. Some of the lecture series organised by students include Public Policy Lecture series, Lecture series on Constitutionalism, Nyaya Forum for Court Room Lawyering, Technology Law Forum and Ambedkar Students Forum.

In this manner the students are allowed to pursue their interests and contribute to the richness of the community life of the University. Students are also encouraged to add to this bouquet of activities with self-funded events. The cultural events organised by SBC include Carpe Diem (4 day cultural extravaganza), Navaratri Festival by organising a Dandiya and Garba Night, Lohri, South India Fest, Awadh Magadh Fest, Rajasthani Fest, Telugu Fest, etc.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment
6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each): The University has made a deliberate choice of concurrent and shared teaching of mandatory courses by faculties. Suggestions and comments received in the feedback are reflected upon to further strengthen this design and revisiting areas of concerns expressed in the feedback accordingly.
Curriculum Development Faculties sharing a course, introduce new modules and revise and update existing modules in consultation with each other and which is then presented in faculty meeting. Further, new courses, both in-house and visiting, are also designed and offered depending upon students' interest. For instance, an exclusive course on Specific Relief was floated by in-house faculty at the University as it was the felt need of both faculties and students that the course holds immense practical significance and demands a dedicated focus instead of clubbing it with other subjects.
Teaching and Learning In furtherance of shared teaching and constructive feedback on the same, faculties identify topics in a course that they will be executing in both sections. These topics are more often areas of strength or current research of faculty and this system ensures that the teacher engages with both sections during the semester. In order to ensure synergy between in class discussions in both sections, faculties sit through each other's sessions as often as possible and make interventions for a more robust interaction.
Examination and Evaluation While the two section system initially had a system of common question paper created by both faculties and each faculty evaluating their own section, the system was changed based on the feedback received. Accordingly, while the question paper remains common for both sections and comprise of questions framed by both faculties, but each faculty evaluates both sections for their part of the question paper. Thus, a system of partial external evaluation was introduced based on feedback received.
Research and Development Based on the discussions in faculty meetings and University bodies, the University recently consolidated its research and development agenda by revisiting composition of various Centres. While a few Centres were amalgamating in keeping with natural alliance of core areas of research, for instance Centre of Corporate and Tax Laws, couple of others such as Centre for Interdisciplinary Studies in Law and Civil Society, Centre for

Animal Rights were newly established to encourage inter-disciplinarily research and unexplored areas of research.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation:

More than 1500 Text books and Reference books were procured for Library. Subscription to existing journals, e-journals, digital databases was continued and two more journals were subscribed during the year. LEX Air book Scanner was procured for use of visually handicapped students. In addition, new RFID work station, J GATE database, FEDGATE and Ezproxy softwares were also procured during the year.

The Video Conference Hall was upgraded by changing the existing sound system and installing new advanced microphones, high density speakers, digital / analog amplifiers, LED projectors, HD camera (IP address), control panel (integration) and video conferencing facility (remote connection). Electrical points were provided beneath tables for the use of audience.

Interpretation facility was created by providing a booth for interpreters and laying down the communication lines to each table and providing a head gear for each member. Carpets and blinds were also replaced in the Conference Hall. More wi-fi access points were also provided in the Academic Block. Number of computers, laptops and printers were procured.

Washrooms in the SAARC Building, Academic Block, Library and some of the Hostels were renovated. Washrooms in various buildings on campus were upgraded for use of the Disabled students. Construction of New Hostel Block VI (G+2 – 24,763 sft) was completed. Additional Gym was established in Boys Hostel VI and equipment worth of Rs.7.6 Lakhs was procured. Solar Power Plant 200 KVA and RO Plant 400 LPA capacity were installed during the year.

Human Resource Management

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

With the introduction of Choice Based Credit System, several credit-based external elective courses have been offered by professionals from the top Law Firms in the country. Besides, the clinic component of the B.A.LL.B degree programme has seen different Clinic courses by professionals, such as GST Clinic, on offer. Guest Lectures, Internship Programme Talks by Law Firms are a regular feature at the University

Admission of Students

Students to various courses are admitted through an all India Admission Test. For the B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) and LL.M. Programmes the admissions are based on Common Law Admission Test conducted for 19 National Law Universities in India. Some seats are earmarked for foreign nationals and admission to that category are made by the Admission Committee. LL.M., students will be admitted after an interview by the PG Admission Committee. Admission to the LL.M., Ph.D. programme is made based on the performance at the written test, SOP, writing sample, interview and the academic performance at the first degree in law. Admission to the Ph.D. programme is based on the admission test and presentation of the preliminary research proposal followed by an interview by the Research Committee.

FIRST BEST PRACTICE

1. **Title of the Practice:** Moot Mentorship

2. **Objective of the Practice:**

The main objective of the programme is to train the students from the first year itself for the Moot Court Competitions and to improve their advocacy, research, drafting and analytical skills. The idea is to inculcate a healthy mooting culture in the University.

3. The Context:

This exercise should be seen in the broader context of furthering University's goal of creating professionally competent and socially sensitive lawyers. Training imparted to the first year students is intended to ensure that on one hand they understand the technical nuances of the profession of lawyering and on the other hand they also appreciate the impact of lawyering on human lives.

4. The Practice:

Senior students are selected as moot mentors based on the Statement of Purpose submitted by them and also their experience in participation of Moot Court Competitions and the awards won by them. Moot Mentors conduct classes to provide basic knowledge of the subject area and also train them on how to research, formatting, spotting the issue, drafting, writing memorials, citation and oral advocacy skills. The Moot Mentors submit monthly reports and also a consolidated report at the end of the semester to the Faculty In-charge indicating the activities undertaken by them. Moot Mentors are given three credits. The evaluation of the Moot Mentors include student feedback, personal evaluation by the Faculty In-charge and evaluation of the monthly consolidated reports submitted by them.

The University also organises introductory Moot Court Competitions for the first year students. A conscious effort is made to encourage them to cull out and present broader policy based arguments in the Intro Moots.

5. Evidence of success:

Student teams from first year also participate in the national and international moot court competitions. During the year, the moot achievements of first year student teams include SLCC (Runners up and Best Speaker); qualified memorial rounds and participated in International Rounds of Asia Cup and secured 8th position; Quarter finalists at NLIU TANKHA Moot etc.

6. Problems encountered and resources required:

Most of the moot mentorship classes are conducted a little later in the evening, mostly post dinner. The spread out timetable of the university does not offer an easy window for holding these classes at any other time. Ideally one would like to see that the sessions get over early in the evening so that students have time for other academic and non-academic activities. We are trying to work out a more comfortable moot class schedule for the batches to come.

SECOND BEST PRACTICE

Title of the Practice: Upgrading of Digital Media wing with Live streaming facility:

Objectives:

1. Integrating of live streaming facilities on all virtualized learning spaces which are enhanced from physical learning environments.
2. Automatic archiving of Developed Digital repository of E-content on to the Social media and proprietary platforms for student's accessibility.
3. Enabling peoples participation in the Academic and research works conducted by the university and accepting and reviewing comments and suggestions of people virtually across the globe through live streaming facilities .

Context:

Digital Media wing has been developing E-content in the form of videos and animation and uploading them on social media platforms like YouTube, Facebook, twitter etc. but entirely static and non-interactive hence in order to improve people's participation substantially and connect the people on across the different regions and platforms dynamically, incorporating and integrating Live streaming technology was concerned need of the hour.

Practice:

Has Upgraded and integrated Live streaming technology for all Digitally enabled classrooms and conference and also out door facilities which are meant for developing E-content with the help of Live Streaming technology with the following hardware and software components:

1. Black Magic Intensity Shuttle (4 No's) to capture and playback in the most incredible quality HDMI and component analog video in both SD and HD2 and to integrated any camera for live streaming of sessions on to any social media platforms like Facebook, YouTube and Twitch.
2. OBS (Open Broadcaster Software) a open-source software suite for recording and live streaming by providing real-time source and device capture, scene composition, encoding, recording, and broadcasting. Transmission of data is primarily done via the Real Time Messaging Protocol (RTMP) and can be sent to any RTMP supporting destination, including many presets for streaming websites such as YouTube, Twitch.tv, Instagram and Facebook.

3. Vimeo an enterprise based video live streaming and sharing platform for registered student's accessibility on different social media platforms for maximum reach out to the target audience using Data analytics and behavior patterns of the society.

Evidence of Success:

1. For 120 live sessions streamed for Distance Education students with 9400 plays followed by 2100 finishes and 100's of comments are registered on the Vimeo Platform.

2. Live streamed convocations, workshops and conference on different Facebook pages maintained by NALSAR with average live count of 500 views.

3. Live interactive Q/A sessions for the participants across the world connecting virtually has decreased logistics challenge's which were prevalent during in-person interactive sessions.

4. Automatic archiving of live streamed sessions enabled for faster E-content development on dissemination purpose.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Being technology obsolete over the period of time, procuring latest technology with limited or No dedicated budgetary provision was a huge challenge for the team.

Upgrading to 4k enabled Multi-camera live streaming facilities need good hands-on training from experts of video production houses with constant skill up gradation programs.

Hosting the 78th Session of Institute of International Law (*Institut de droit international or IDI*)

As highlighted in AQAR 2016-17 NALSAR has been cultivating a culture of collegiality by reaching out to eminent scholars and other institutions of excellence to have vibrant knowledge exchanges and forge collaborative relationships. In this spirit of reciprocity NALSAR hosted the 78th Session of Institute of International Law (*Institut de droit international or IDI*) from September 3rd to 10th, 2017. The Institute was established in 1873, following the creation of the International Committee of Red Cross, to promote peaceful settlement of disputes amongst States, the Institute was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1904. The Institute has a tradition of holding its biennial meetings in Europe. Only once before had it moved out of Europe

and NALSAR was able to convince the Institute on the value of holding the session in India and at NALSAR.

The initiative was of special value to the collegial enterprise of NALSAR as the 78th Session of IDI attracted delegates from over 65 different countries and included distinguished judges, jurists, arbitrators. Many of the delegates have been involved in the settlement of international disputes and were associated with the International Court of Justice (ICJ), The Permanent Court of Arbitration (PCA) or Arbitral Tribunals dealing with investments, international trade law, land and maritime boundaries as well as river water disputes. Some of the eminent scholars who participated in this time's deliberation included Lord Lawrence Collins, Sir Christopher Greenwood, Sir Antonio Trindade, Sir Kenneth Keith, Prof Eyal Benvenisti, Judge Abdul Koroma, Judge Xue Hanqin, Prof. Micheal Reisman, etc. A number of them have been associated in recent years with the settlement of disputes involving India against Bangladesh, Pakistan, Marshal Islands and Italy.

Conversations on Contemporary Struggles towards the Realisation of Socio-Economic Rights

- NALSAR takes pride in walking its talk and garnering knowledge from whoever possesses it. The international conference on 'Contemporary Struggles towards the Realisation of Socio-Economic Rights' at NALSAR from November 2-5, 2017" organised by the Centre for Legal Philosophy and Justice Education was such an effort. The Conference set up multi-stakeholder conversations without privileging the knowledge possessed by any one stakeholder.
- Speakers and listeners were equally valued and eminent people were invited to be part of the listening assembly. In further recognition of the expertise possessed by the delegates, each of them was interviewed by faculty and students from NALSAR and shared virtually. Recognizing the varied ways of learning, the training and skills of traditional street performers was also recorded and made available on YouTube.
- The conference created a synergy between the cerebral and emotional by drawing on the cultural. On the first night there was a street performance by a community of traditional street artistes who were facing imminent loss of their livelihood. It is their lived reality that founded the conversations on deskilling and loss of livelihoods in the panel titled The Vanishing Horizons of Work. On the next night, the Ruchika Theatre Group from Delhi staged Tea, a play directed by Mr. Feisal Alkazi, which dwelled on the deep scars of discrimination another theme of the Conference.
- In final exemplification of precept informing practice cotton dupattas made by the handloom workers of Dastkar Andhra were presented as mementos to all the panellists. Likewise, the folders and bags

distributed at the conference were sourced from Kriti Social Initiatives, an organisation that works towards building livelihoods among the urban poor.

8. Future Plans of action for next academic year (500 words)

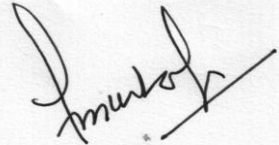
- To involve students in the task of curriculum development and further narrow the gap between teaching and learning

- To start offering online courses through MOOCS
- To design training programmes for executives of governmental and non-governmental organisations
- To enhance faculty appointments to retain a suitable teacher -student ratio
- To explore strategies for encouraging faculty to undertake minor and major research projects and to enhance the activities of various advanced research centres
- To expand the infrastructure to meet the needs of a growing community
- To make the NALSAR campus and the residential facilities inclusive spaces for all
